1.1 Multilateral Networks, the future of international collaboration? Broadening the European University Alliances (Room: N0071/73)

The European Commission states: "European Universities are transnational alliances that will lead the way towards the universities of the future, promoting European values and identity and enhancing the quality and competitiveness of European higher education."

How do we create and uphold multilateral global and regional, value-based networks? In this session we want to explore with our partners what we all require to build and maintain functioning and impactful networks in a globalized world, using the example of the Erasmus+ funding scheme of European Alliances.

This workshop will showcase different joint study projects between Universität Hamburg teaching staff in collaboration with their international partners. With various approaches to joint teaching and learning, the workshop participants will discuss examples of blended-learning and teaching as well as COIL projects. Individual joint teaching projects are a way of connecting and internationalizing students and lecturers besides a semester abroad, they diversify the curriculum and allow for different approaches to learning.

The goal is to give an overview of what is possible, hear about activities at the partner institutions, and inspire the participants to facilitate innovative joint teaching projects in the future.

2.1 Exploring collaboration with UK universities (Room: N0071/73)

This workshop looks at challenges and opportunities for collaboration in research and student mobility with universities in the UK post-Brexit. With political changes, changes in access to funding but also new opportunities, the higher education sector faces a unique set of circumstances that require innovative approaches to foster continued collaboration. The discussion will consider common goals and interests, funding solutions, navigating regulatory changes (e.g. regarding visa) and discuss which measures are most effective in ensuring a sustainable partnership between all partners. We seek to empower attendees with actionable strategies and creative solutions for navigating the new academic landscape. Together we will explore the opportunities that collaborations bring to research and student mobility in the face of a changing world.

Collaborating with international peers enhances the credibility and reach of research projects, opening doors to international funding opportunities and high-level publications.

Furthermore, interdisciplinary networking facilitates a unique fusion of ideas from different domains, enabling the development of multifaceted approaches to complex problems.

The purpose of this workshop is to exchange ideas on how to best support early career researchers in their intention to establish sustainable international partnerships, effectively communicate across cultural barriers, and navigate the challenges and opportunities that arise in interdisciplinary research.
