Application period: 1 June - 15 July (winter semester) and 1 December - 15 January (summer semester)

Semester start: 1 October (winter semester) und 1 April (summer semester)

Language(s) of instruction: English

Introduction

This Master's program runs for four semesters: two semesters of courses at the University of Hamburg, the third semester (as a rule outside of Germany, though exceptions are possible) at one of our partner universities; the fourth semester will be dedicated to writing a Master's thesis. The aim of the program is to acquire an in-depth knowledge of South Asian cultures, societies and languages, of theories and methods of scholarly analysis in this field as well as of skills applicable in academic, governmental and social sectors. Description of content

Classical Indology (Ancient and Medieval South Asian Studies)

The emphasis is on advanced training in Sanskrit (and optionally Middle-Indic) and in philology. Courses include seminars on philology and codicology, and seminars in which a variety of religious (Buddhist, Hindu, and/or Jain), philosophical, and secular texts in Sanskrit are studied in depth. The main research areas of the department include Indian Buddhism, Tantric Studies, Indian philosophy, and classical Sanskrit literature (kāvyā); all of these are well represented in teaching.

A colloquium in which students, faculty and guest speakers present their research offers the opportunity to acquire presentation skills and to participate in scholarly discussion and exchange.

All courses are taught in English; texts in Sanskrit are used as data for information and analysis.

Admission requirements

University degree

A Bachelor's degree „Sprachen und Kulturen des Indischen Subkontinents und Tibet“ from the Universität Hamburg or a comparable Bachelor of a German or officially recognized international academic institution in one of the following subjects: Language and Culture of the Indian Subcontinent and Tibet (with focus on: language, literature, religion, philosophy or language, literature, societies), South Asian Studies, Indology, South Asian Studies, Asian Studies or an equivalent subject.

If you have not received your degree certificate yet, you can submit this by the end of the first semester of your master's program. Please see the "Documents to submit" section below for details.

Additional special admission requirements

Proof of competence in at least one modern language of the Indian subcontinent or Sanskrit with a minimum of 20 credit points or proof of an equivalent language training.

In case no sufficient evidence for competence in one modern language of the Indian subcontinent or Sanskrit can be provided within the application period the candidate will have the possibility to undergo a placement test conducted by the Universität Hamburg which has to be passed.

All applicants must provide evidence for proficiency in English (equivalent to B2 level of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR)); English native speakers don't need evidence B2.

Please submit uncertified copies of all documents. For documents not issued in German or English, a certified German or English translation is required.

- **Signed printout of your online application**
- **Degree certificate or provisional Transcript of Records**
If you are still studying when you apply and cannot yet provide a final certificate containing your grades, please submit your current Transcript of Records confirming your provisional grade point average. You will then need to submit your degree certificate by the end of the first semester of your master's program.
- **Transcript(s) of Records** (same as 'Academic Transcript' or 'Mark Sheet').
The relevance for South Asian Studies of the area (or sub-area) in which you completed your first and/or second university degree should be evident from the certificate and/or Transcript of Records. A minimum of 30 credit points (ECTS) for language courses in Sanskrit (for specialization in Classical Indology), in one of the modern literary languages of the Indian Subcontinent (for specialization in Modern South Asian Studies), or equivalent language proficiency is required.
- **Higher school certificate.**
- **Curriculum Vitae**
- **Letter of motivation**
- All applicants who received their secondary education outside of U.K., Ireland, USA, Canada (except Quebec), New Zealand, Australia and South Africa must provide an internationally recognized **certificate of proficiency in English** (equivalent to B2 level of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR), IELTS min. 6,5).
