 "Tierpark Hagenbeck" is located in
 Hamburg's district Stellingen and was
 founded in 1907. It was the first zoo that
 had enclosures surrounded by moats
 rather than cages. This means visitors can
 experience the animals in a more natural
 environment.
- SKIING HOLIDAYS IN MARCH Hamburg is the only federal state where pupils have two weeks of skiing holidays in March.
- "HAMBURGER FISCHMARKT" (FISH MARKET)
 Everyone from Hamburg has visited the
 famous fish market at least once. You can
 buy fish, flowers, clothing and large bags

of fruit there.

- LARGEST JAPANESE GARDEN IN EUROPE
 "Planten und Blomen", with its Japanese
 garden, is located near Universität
 Hamburg. The Japanese garden was
 landscaped in 1988 and is the biggest
 Japanese garden in Europe.
- WORLD'S LARGEST TRAIN SET Hamburg is famous for its "Miniatur Wunderland", which features miniature versions of Hamburg airport, the Alps, America, Scandinavia and much more. There are 12,000 meters of tracks and the miniature worlds are spread across 6,400 square meters of floor space.
- WORLD RECORD NUMBER OF BRIDGES
 Hamburg has a world record: Hamburg has more than 2,300 bridges and is therefore the city with the most bridges worldwide it has even more than Venice and Amsterdam.
- CITY AND FEDERAL STATE Hamburg is called the Free and Hanseatic City of Hamburg and is therefore both a city and a federal state.

- Project: "Hochzeitswald" citizens can donate trees for special events such as weddings




ECKERNFÖRDE, GERMAN

- Grocery stores, unlike in the rest of Germany, are open on Sundays.

- The famous magician, Roy Horn, also well known for his performance as "Roy" in "Siegfried and Roy" in Las Vegas, was born in Nordenham and used to go for walks, with his cheetah Chico, at our local beach.
- The city Bremerhaven is close by but to get there you have to go by ferry or drive through the Weser tunnel.

OMSK, RUSSIA

- Omsk is located in southwestern Siberia.
 It's the seventh-largest city in Russia.

 First of all it's an essential transport node Omsk serves as a train station for Trans-Siberian Railway and as a staging post for the Irtysh River.
- It was established in the XVIII century, in 1716. The order of Peter I on seeking gold deposits in those lands was the reason for its establishment. The expedition was headed by Ivan Buchholz. It was him who laid the first Omsk fortress for the defense of the southern and eastern borders of the Russian Empire on the left bank of the river Om. Gradually, a new city began setting up around the fortress.
- Almost after a century, Omsk became the regional center of the West Siberian governor generalship.
- For a brief period during the Russian Civil War in 1918–1920, it served as the capital of the anti-Bolshevik Russian State and held the imperial gold reserves.
- Omsk is a leader among Siberian cities as per the number of higher and specialized educational institutions.

- 41 organizations, including institutions of Omsk scientific centre of the Siberian branch of the Russian Academy of Science, are engaged in various scientific researches and developments.
- The city has rich sports traditions. Every year such sports events as Siberian International Marathon, All-Russian Day of Run "Cross-country Race of Nations" sports festival "Velo-Omsk" take place.
- It is the center of oil, chemical and petrochemical, energy industries. Russia's largest engineering and metalworking companies are located there.
- Average daily temperatures, taken over the past three decades, are +20°C (68°F) for July and -17 °C (1°F) for January, although temperatures can very rarely reach +40 °C (104°F) in the summer and very rarely drop to -45 °C (-49°F) in the winter.
